Fatherhood Wins

- Your Advocacy Helped Improve Federal Child Support Policies
- Recent Regulations (effective 01/19/2017) Included Key Elements of the *Responsible Fatherhood Act*
 - **Focused on Actual Ability to Pay**
 - No Longer Treats Incarceration as "Voluntary" Nonpayment
 - Included Better Reporting Data (e.g., Process of Setting and Modifying Child Support Obligations, Effect of Debt on Retention)
- Delayed Implementation of Regs in Some States
 - > Some States May See Delayed Implementation of these Final Rules Due to Required Changes in State Law That Need to Happen First.

- Fatherhood-Related Programs within Subcommittee Jurisdiction
 - > Child Support
 - ➤ Child Welfare and Family First Prevention Services Act (P.L. 115-123)
 - > Fatherhood and Healthy Marriage Grants





- Child Welfare/Family First Prevention Services Act
 - > Preserving Families. States have repeatedly made the case they can reduce costs and keeps families together if they can use IV-E for prevention services.
 - ➤ Systemically Addressing Substance Use/Opioid Issues. A major reason kids come into foster care is parental substance abuse (nationally more than one in three, CT witness said than 60% and KY was about the same). We can help solve the substance abuse problem and avoid child trauma at the same time.





- Family First: Title I, Prevention Services
 - ➤ Beginning in FY2020, Title IV-E (uncapped partial matching dollars) would be available for up to 12 months for services (per family/episode) for families of children who, without these services, would likely enter foster care, and pregnant and parenting foster youth. No income test, and families could be served for multiple episodes without a gap between episodes.
 - > These services would include:
 - Mental health services;
 - **Substance abuse services; and**
 - **❖** In-home parent "skill-based" programs (like parent training, home visiting, individual and family therapy).





• Healthy Marriage & Responsible Fatherhood Grants

➤ Fatherhood Grants: \$75 million for 35 Programs and 5 Re-entry Grants

➤ Healthy Marriage: \$75 million for 46 Programs

> Funding: Expires 6/30/2019

(grants are till 2020)

Call for Proposals: Fall 2019
